Dear Parents/Carers

Year 11 Easter school

As we approach the last term for Year 11, I would like to take this opportunity of thanking you for your ongoing support and cooperation. The approaching Easter holiday is a crucial time for student's exam preparation where sufficient revision can make a significant difference to the overall grades a student achieves in the summer. On returning from Easter, there will only be 15 school days until the first GCSE written exams start.

It is so important that students are working independently at home each evening and that students engage with all the revision material and resources that have been provided. A reminder that for students in Year 11, the national average is between 3-4 hours of revision each evening.

In addition to the revision that students should be carrying out at home, revision sessions are also taking place during the Easter holidays. Below is the timetable of the sessions that are being delivered over the Easter break. These sessions are to supplement and support the revision that students should be doing at home and not a replacement for it.

What is CAMHS and how do I access support for my child?

Child and Adolescent Mental Health Services - also known as CAMHS - support children and young people up to age 18 with their emotional and mental health and wellbeing.

When we talk about your mental health, we mean how you feel and how you cope with the things going on in your life. This could be connected to anything from school, your friends or even your family life. If you feel you aren't coping too well with the ups and downs of life, it may be that you need some support to help you manage them better.

If you do need help, CAMHS will work together with you and your family to decide what support you need to have good mental health and wellbeing. Our aim is to help young people get the support they need to tackle any problems early on before they get worse, and to act quickly if they do.

Mersey Care NHS Foundation Trust, Warrington Council, local schools, school nurses, social services and other local organisations including Kooth and St Joseph's Family Centre, all work closely together to provide CAMHS services across Warrington, to make sure you can access the right support, in the right place and at the right time.

How to access the service and the support available for young people

If you have any worries about your mental health and wellbeing, you can come along to our weekly Mind Works drop-in clinics so you can speak to a mental health professional about any concerns you have.

No matter how big or small, our staff will talk to you and ask questions about your difficulties, then offer advice and signpost you to other local services that can help if needed.

It's an informal drop-in session, so you don't need to make an appointment – you can just turn up.

If you have any questions you can call CAMHS directly on <u>01925 575 904</u>. Your parents or carers can also call us too if they'd like to speak to someone. You can call this number between 9am and 5pm, from Monday to Friday.

If you need support outside these hours, you can contact the CAMHS Response Team every day until 9pm, on <u>01744 627 618</u>. If you need immediate medical attention, you should visit your local A&E department.

We also accept referrals from other professionals, such as GPs, school nurses or social workers. If you are a professional and would like to make a referral for a young person you are working with, visit the health professionals section of our website to download the referral form.

Attendance and academic performance

As Year 11 approach the GCSE examinations, we would like to remind all about the importance of high levels of attendance to school. Good attendance and academic performance often go hand in hand. Consistently attending classes provides students with the opportunity to engage with course materials, participate in discussions, and receive instruction from teachers or professors. Here's how good attendance can contribute to academic success:

- Access to Instruction: Regular attendance ensures that students have access to the information and instruction provided in class. Missing classes can result in gaps in understanding and knowledge, including key exam tips.
- 2. **Participation**: Attending classes allows students to actively participate in discussions, group activities, and other learning experiences that can enhance comprehension and retention of course material.
- 3. **Teacher Interaction**: Attending classes allows students to interact with their teachers or professors, ask questions, seek clarification, and receive feedback on their work. This interaction is invaluable for understanding complex topics and refining academic skills.
- 4. **Peer Learning**: Classroom interactions also provide opportunities for peer learning and collaboration. Students can learn from their classmates, share perspectives, and work together to solve problems, reinforcing their understanding of the material.
- 5. **Routine and Discipline**: Regular attendance helps students establish a routine and develop discipline, both of which are essential for academic success. By consistently attending classes, students cultivate habits that contribute to their overall productivity and performance.
- 6. **Opportunity to Stay Updated**: In many cases, important announcements, changes to assignments, and additional resources are provided during class time. Attending regularly ensures students stay informed and can take advantage of these opportunities.

Overall, good attendance sets the foundation for academic success by ensuring that students have access to instruction, opportunities for participation, and valuable interactions with teachers and peers. It is an essential component of effective learning and achievement in academic settings.

A few further points to consider and question your child on.

- Is your child above the school target of 96%?
- 90% is good as an exam result or test result, but not in the attendance world. A student with 90% at the end of this week will have missed around 64 hours of learning.
- Below 90% means that your child falls into the category of persistent absenteeism and triggers a formal stage of attendance intervention.
- 95% attendance at the end of this week still means that a student will have missed 32 hours of learning.
- Remember, if your child is off school, they are missing out.

MCKS Charitable Foundation

Another half term down, and another half term of support from MCKS Charitable Foundation UK (MCKS). The registered charity continues to provide schools across the country with support for their most vulnerable students and families, by donating food, toiletries, and much needed sanitary supplies.

Personal Development

We have some online courses coming up created by doctors for students interested in careers in medicine.

Are you interested in a career in the medical Industry? These courses are for Year 9 and above. There may be a fee for some.

All include a certificate for use in med school applications and are ideal preparation for students applying for university degrees in medicine and those younger students too who may be considering the profession.

- 1) Emergency Medicine Live on Sunday 24th March. You can expect to learn about the treatment and management of major trauma and medical emergencies. With insights into pre-hospital and emergency medicine. Students can see more information here.
- 2) Medicine Career Day Live Saturday 30th March. An ideal day for students wanting to know all about the medical profession, learn about the personal statement for medicine, UCAT examinations and gain some work experience in the afternoon by helping to treat and diagnose patients. <u>Students</u> can see more information here.
- 3) Medical Ethics Live, on Sunday the 7th April 2024. It's vital to understand medical ethics when applying to med school and how to understand moral dilemmas and ethical questions doctors face everyday. It's highly likely that you'll be asked ethics questions or face an MMI station designed to test your understanding of medical ethics so it's really important you understand some of the questions you will face at medical school interviews. Students just need to register here.
- 4) Surgery Work experience Live taking place on Sunday 21st April 2024. This interactive day is designed to give students a meaningful insight into careers in medicine and surgery. Students join a patient on their journey from initial presentation to diagnosis and treatment. The doctors will guide you through how they would conduct a surgical consultation, interpret signs and manage patients. All the details available here.
- 5) Suture Like A Surgeon online Course. Sunday 12th May 2024. Join our suturing masterclass where you will learn how surgeons effectively manage and assess acute wounds with suture closure. You will be sent our suture kit in the mail before the course starts so you can suture along with the doctors, learning first-hand the various techniques needed to be a surgeon. All courses have been created by doctors and provide outstanding work experience for you to use in your applications to medicine.

Work Experience

The students who have been in school have taken part in a digital workshop and an army workshop highlighting the pathways for these professions.


