The role of a governor

The Challenge Academy Trust is recruiting governors to support academies within our MAT. This is an opportunity to make a positive difference and become a key part of the communities our trust serves. Our academies are based in Warrington, St Helens and Wirral and we are looking for people from diverse backgrounds, with a range of experiences to bring interesting

perspectives to our Local Governing Bodies. Our academies benefit greatly from working with skilled volunteers.

Governors do not need to be educational experts or have any specific qualifications, the ability to listen, debate new ideas and work collaboratively is what matters most.



What does an academy governor do?

Governors enable our academies to run as effectively as possible, acting as critical friends to the headteacher and senior leaders to provide excellent education to children.

The governor role is strategic rather than operational. Governors don't get involved with the day-today running of a school, instead supporting, and challenging the school's leadership team to drive school improvement. They champion the work the school does.

The three functions of our governing board are to:



Ensure school/ academy's clarity of vision, ethos and strategic direction



Oversee school/academy budgets and ensure money is well spent



Hold leaders to account for the educational performance of the school/academy

Activities include:



Attending governing board meetings. These normally take place around six times a year and may be held outside of school hours.



Looking at information and evidence on the progress of schools and discussing with executive leaders.



Visiting schools to see plans working in practice and listening to the views of staff, pupils and parents.



Undertaking induction training and ongoing development.

Eligibility

To be eligible to volunteer you need:

- The time to contribute.
- To be aged 18 or over.
- Not to be disqualified under the relevant rules and procedures.

- Bespoke 'Becoming the Chair' training programme for interested colleagues to support succession planning.
- Regular meeting/forum for TCAT Chairs of LGBs to share practice, ideas, challenges and expertise.
