Dear Parents/Carers

I hope you are well.

Please can I just remind everyone that punctuality to school and to lessons is crucial so that there is no lost learning. I appreciate the Warrington traffic can be unkind at times and that the bus service is not always reliable. However, we need every effort to make sure we are all in the right place at the right time. Please have a conversation with your child around the important of being on time to lessons too. I understand that they are not going to love every subject with the same passion, but they still need to be there on time ready to learn. We work really hard in school with the young people to get this message across, but it really helps if it is reinforced at home too.

I appreciate there have been a few queue issues at break and lunchtime this week. We have had till failures and a whole host of other issues and I can only apologise. However, I have still ensured everyone who was queueing, despite the bell going, was able to get food. Please can you remind the young people (in normal circumstances with no till failures) that when the bell goes and they then decide to come in for food, this is not acceptable. I am on the queue every day and it is VERY carefully timed as to when some people turn up. The gueue is always gone by 13.35 so there is plenty of time to get lunch. Whilst I appreciate the importance of sport in the Ball Hall, some of the young people need to be aware of time management. I would never turn away a child for food, however, when some decide to try and play the system that is a very different situation. In these circumstances I will still allow them to grab a sandwich, but that is all because, they are making a considered choice about how to manage their time. I can assure you there is not a queue issue from 13.35. If they attend a club they can always get a lunch pass signed by their club/council leader so they can be in the fast queue system.

We had our Careers Fair this week which was a huge success. We had a range of employers who exhibited and the all the students had a fabulous experience. We have had incredibly positive feedback from the employers around the student participation and engagement. Our young people here have a substantial careers curriculum and the employers fed back that this was apparent from the conversations they were having. It was wonderful to see two former students back in the building but as an employer rather than a student. I did however, feel incredible old, but incredibly proud of them. They were both great ambassadors for the impact of the Careers Fair process and also how important it is to engage with CEIAG (careers education information advice and guidance) as well.

Anti-Bullying Week 2023 – Monday 11th to 15th November

Next week is National Anti-bullying week and here at Sir Thomas Boteler Church of England High School, with our mission statement 'Through God, we care', we will not tolerate bullying. Next week we will be working with our students in the Personal Development lessons and tutor sessions, to ensure that students understand, that together, we can bring an end to bullying.

Bullying is not welcome in our school and all members of our community are encouraged to report anything of any concern as soon as possible. We will always aim to deal with reports quickly and effectively and we will continue with our relentless drive to create an environment where children feel safe and supported.

The below can be found in our school Ant-Bullying Policy on our school website:

The school aims to:

- Prevent bullying behaviour in school so far as reasonably practicable
- Promote tolerance and fairness
- Deal effectively with incidents of bullying
- Ensure all students are safe in school
- Support victims of bullying and educate the perpetrator
- Ensure proportionate sanctions and support are in place for bullies.

The strategies that our school will adopt to achieve our aims and prevent bullying are:

- Promotion of our Christian Values of Hope, Compassion, Endurance and our mission statement, 'Through God, We Care'.
- Providing a caring community in which students are encouraged to work together with each other in line with our school rules of being Ready, Respectful and Safe (RRS).
- Raising awareness (at all levels) of bullying behaviour through a range of activities. This
 includes all staff being aware that safeguarding issues can manifest themselves via child
 on child abuse and will follow the school safeguarding procedures. All staff must complete
 the Hays online safeguarding module.
- Improving students' social skills and dealing effectively with bullying should it occur.
- Improving staff skills in dealing consistently and effectively with incidents of bullying.
- Identified student anti-bullying champions/Ambassadors to support the work of the school in preventing bullying.
- Involving the parents/carers of the victim and the bully, when appropriate. A range of communication strategies will be adopted, including parent meetings, letters and phone calls. Communication with SEND students, who struggle to express themselves may need different ways (e.g. An advocate) to help them get their opinions heard and understood.
- Disablist language, homophobic or racist language are taken seriously and challenged.
- Differences are actively and visibly celebrated and welcome across the whole school.
- Utilise positive student role models as mentors for victims and participants.
- Assemblies are used to encourage students to reflect on the issues surrounding bullying.
- Student friendly posters and advice displayed throughout school to encourage students to report incidents.
- Using outside agencies to help support the school around bullying, including Warrington Youth Club, Safer Schools Partnership and the police and children's services where bullying is particularly serious or persistent, particularly where a criminal offence may have been committed.
- Actively promoting Anti-Bullying Week, E-Safety Week and similar initiatives to reduce the risk of bullying.
- Regularly evaluate and update approach to take account of developments, including that of technology.
